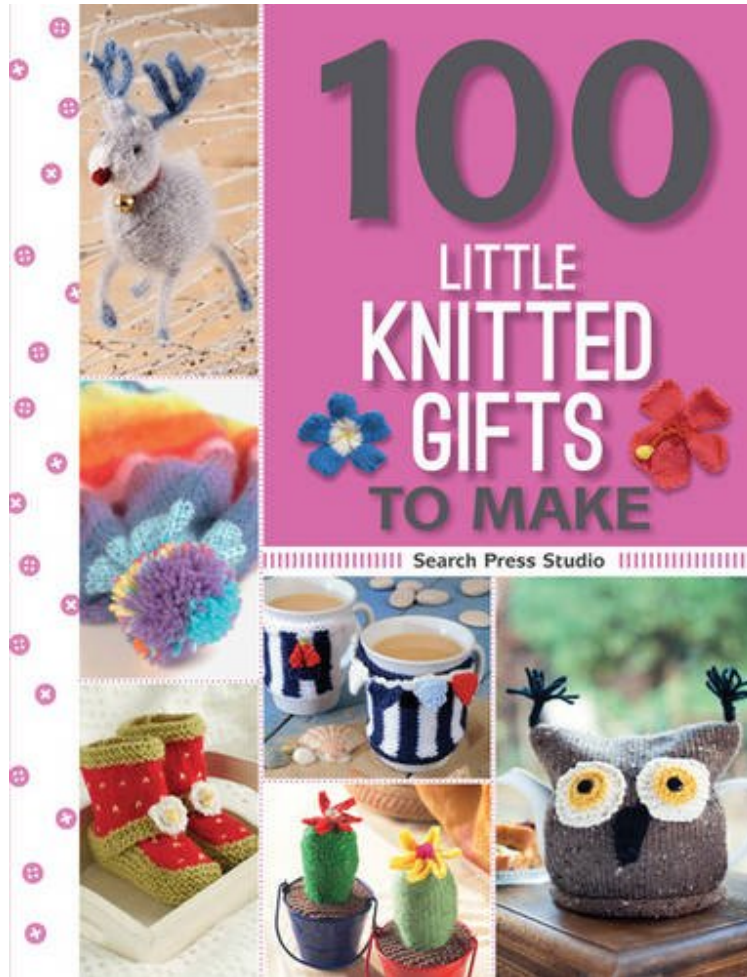


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## 100 Little Knitted Gifts to Make (100 to Make)

There are some very nice projects in this book and but there are some that I personally do not see as gifts. I'll start with the projects I like first.There are 7 tea cosies that are just adorable! I like them all and will have a hard time choosing the first one to make.There are 5 mug hugger patterns, some with variations. Cute gifts to give.The book also contains approximately 37 wearable knits from hand warmers, booties, hats and scarves, and boot toppers. Some good basic items to pick from.There is also a variety of critters such as bears, reindeer, snowman and aliens. I would count several items as Christmas ornaments.Lastly there are 6 phone socks. I think a couple of these could even be used as small gift bags. :)Now for the items I am not as crazy about being called gifts.There are approximately 24

patters that are produce, flowers and food. The flowers are such that you could add them onto other items but most likely most of us would not give them as a gift. There are 12 produce patterns. Out of all of these I can only see that I would use maybe 4 of these patterns, the first being the pumpkin. As I thought about them, the carrots and asparagus could be used as baby chew toys. I guess you could argue that the other produce and food can be made for children. I will have to admit that I really liked the doughnuts and can see me making a few of them. :) My last comment will be that there are 3 items on the front of the book that I could not find the patterns to. I did not see the strawberry booties, the nautical mug huggers and the rainbow looking hat.
